PASTOR'S COLUMN

"Easter!"

This Sunday, March 31st, is Easter. "Christ is risen! Christ is risen indeed!"

Easter is considered a movable Christian Feast with dates that vary from year to year. Last year we celebrated Easter on April 9th. Next year Easter arrives on April 20th.

Easter is observed on the Sunday following the first full moon after the vernal equinox. In some faith traditions, this is referred to as the "Paschal Full Moon," connecting the full moon to the Jewish observance of Passover. The scientific community calls it the "Worm Full Moon," the final full moon of winter. The planting and growing season is upon us.

Since Easter is relatively early this year, many stores had Chocolate Bunnies and Peeps available alongside their Valentine hearts.

Regardless of when Easter arrives, it is our best day of the year. God defeats the power of death once and for all. As followers of Jesus, we discover that there is more to this life than what we can see and experience. When Jesus was crucified, his first followers thought that they had lost everything.

But then, beginning on Easter, they began to see the power of God in an entirely new way. They came alive. Their faith blossomed. Death no longer was the last word.

Come and celebrate with us this Sunday. Invite your family, friends and neighbors to join us. (After all, we will need to wait a year and three weeks before we celebrate Easter Sunday again.)

Porchlight Solutions to Homelessness

Porchlight is the largest non-profit provider of affordable housing in Madison, with 350 units across 26 sites, ranging from single room occupancy units to family units with 1-4 bedrooms. Porchlight provides emergency shelter, outreach services, eviction prevention, employment services, recovery support, and affordable transitional and permanent housing to over 8,000 people annually. Porchlight housing serves low-income men, women, and children, and has programs that focus on the unique needs of Veterans and individuals with mental illness.

Porchlight Products is a paid employment-training program that works with disabled and formerly homeless individuals who have struggled to return to or remain in a mainstream employment setting. We employ an often-marginalized group to help them develop a sense of purpose, accomplishment, and satisfaction in their lives that contributes to their stability and independence. Trainees learn basic job skills such as proper hygiene and time management, as well as the skills to take raw ingredients and turn them into quality food products. These products are then available at local stores and on the menus of area restaurants.

The Whitehorse family, who are members of the Ho Chunk nation and of our congregation, will present the message that morning.


