SCHOLARSHIPS AVAILABLE

PASTOR'S COLUMN

"The Season of Lent"

Lent is upon us.

Lent is a season of forty days, not including Sundays, that begins with Ash Wednesday and ends with Holy Saturday, the day before Easter. (Interestingly, even during a "leap year" when we have an extra day in February, Lent remains only forty days.)

The English word Lent comes from the Anglo-Saxon word, "lencten" which means to lengthen and is quite often associated with the lengthening of days in spring. Lent begins in the midst of winter and ends in spring. While we probably have memories of snowy Easters, we look forward to the many signs of spring.

For those who live in the Southern Hemisphere, below the equator, the opposite happens. Lent starts in fall and ends in winter, during a dormant time in many places.

Whether we live in the Northern or Southern Hemisphere, during Lent we remember the forty days that Jesus spent in the wilderness tempted by Satan. That was Jesus' final preparation before he launched his public ministry.

Lent is a gift for us as we pay attention to our relationship with God. Or, Lent may be that time when God surprises us and reminds us that we are God's cherished children.

The Roots of the Tea Trade Potong Tea Garden, Darjeeling, India

Did you know that tea is the second most popular drink in the world-second only to water?

Most of Equal Exchange's tea partners are small farmers: they own just a few hectares of land and cultivate a mix of tea and other commercial crops like spices for export, as well as crops for their own kitchen. Through their democratic organizations, farmers can pool their resources and their harvests to trade at a viable scale.

The top four tea producing countries today are China, India, Kenya, and Sri Lanka respectively—

While Equal Exchange's purchases of tea are important to our partners, our relationships with them goes far beyond commercial trade. Over the years, Equal Exchange has contributed funding to help Potong Tea Garden in their tea bush replanting efforts, replacing many of the bushes originally planted in the 1800s. And in 2017, Equal Exchange, together with our supporters, raised funds to help Potong through a challenging time. That year, Potong lost about 70% of their annual harvest during a 104-day shutdown stemming from political unrest in the region. Equal Exchange's support helped farmers make ends meet despite the lost income.

Through good times and bad times, our futures as consumers are intertwined with the futures of small farmers. We are proud to celebrate more than 35 years of changing trade and more than 20 years of solidarity with tea farmers in India and Sri Lanka.

Thank you for your support as we continue to build a market for small farmers and work for positive change in the tea industry, together.

MUMC'S COMMITMENT TO CARE FOR GOD'S CREATION

Long before I arrived in Monona, our church had made an unwritten covenant to be a "green church" as a way to express our respect and reverence for God's creation.

We had determined that we would use fewer paper products at our social events and began serving most of our meals with our china and silverware. Several years later, we also began advocating for preparing and eating plant-based meals.

In the past few years, we have installed LED lighting throughout the building. In addition, we signed up for renewable energy with MG&E.

This month we will install solar panels on the south side of our church roof to regulate our use of electricity.

Outside our building, we have offered gardeners plots in a community garden, and we have established a food forest with help from Emily Steinwehe, who works with the Wisconsin Food Forests Project in Madison.

This spring, we will plant a $60 \ge 10$ foot rain garden to prevent flooding and reduce toxic run-off into our sewer system. You can donate plants from your gardens or funds to purchase plants to make this garden beautiful.

Over the years, we have been establishing our identity as a church that has made a commitment to care for God's creation in what may be small, but are nevertheless determined, ways.

We believe that small steps matter, and can lead us to larger ones.

As another part of our journey, we are reflecting on what our church has been doing to express our care for the earth. And in the future, we plan to share more about what we are learning about stewardship of our environment with all of you and with our eastside neighbors.

One of our hopes is that the community of Monona will recognize our congregation's commitment to creation care, will celebrate these small steps with us, and may even join us in some of this work.

We believe that these most recent efforts are obvious fruits of our breakthrough prayer. God has led our early steps as a 'green church' into new ways to care for God's wondrous earth that we could never have imagined!

NEWS ABOUT THE MUMC RAIN GARDEN PROJECT



When it rains, it pours off the roofs of our church property, and lots of runoff floods down our parking lot, out into the street and into storm drains. Such unmanaged storm water can create **two major issues**: one related to the volume and timing of runoff, **flooding**, and the other related to potential contaminants the water is carrying, **pollution**.

In natural landscapes soil absorbs much of the storm water. Plants in the landscape also capture water as it rains and take up water through their roots. **Rain gardens are a type** of water harvesting that helps slow and absorb runoff from storms. Rain gardens capture rainwater, filter out pollutants, and recharge our groundwater. In the process, they reduce pollution and prevent flooding.

MUMC's budding rain garden at this point is a 60 foot long shallow depression located on the west side of our building. Last fall, to prepare the ground for planting, we covered the area with cardboard, to kill off the grass, and topped it with woodchips from a tree that had to be taken down to make room for our upcoming solar panel project.

Our church has just been accepted into the Plant Dane NATIVE PLANT PROJECT. This program offers us the opportunity to purchase beautiful native plants for the rain garden for the low price of \$2.88 each. We will need a lot of plants. We want to give our members the opportunity to express our love for God's creation by sharing a variety of plants from our own beautiful gardens early this summer and/or by donating funds for plant purchases from Plant Dane. - The wishing well is set up in fellowship hall to receive our offerings.

We can't wait to see the beauty of this garden when it is planted in the spring and as it grows over the years. Please, join in asking for God's blessings on our church's rain garden project.

STEWARDSHIP - THERE NEVER SEEMS TO BE ENOUGH

Sometimes it flies, sometimes it crawls, but it always passes inexorably. We mark it, save it, waste it, bide it, race against it. We measure it incessantly with a passion for precision that borders on the obsessive. We are obsessed with it; we never seem to have enough of it; and yet scientists don't even know how to explain it. What is it? The answer is time.

We never seem to have enough time. A group of experts once got together to figure out how much time we should need to get everything done in one day. These experts got together and noted how much time was needed for exercise, hygiene, work, commuting, household chores, eating, entertainment, spiritual development, sleep, and family time. When these figures were all added together, the experts said that a human being needs 42 hours a day. That's not very encouraging.

Of course, those are the things we're supposed to be doing every day according to experts. In truth, we add to that list as well. Consider that every day in the United States:

- 74,000 of us move to a different home and 22,465 move to another state.
- 36 businesses go bankrupt while 13,700 new ones start up.
- Americans purchase 38,082 new automobiles and trucks and smash 16,438.
- 2,266 couples get divorced while 6,578 get married.
- Dogs bite 12,329 people including 15 mail carriers.

• We eat 75 acres of pizza, 53 million hotdogs, 167 million eggs, 3 million gallons of ice cream, and 3,000 tons of candy.

The Psalmist tells us that "This is the day the Lord has made, let us rejoice and be glad in it." In other words, every moment of every second, and every second of every minute, and every minute of every hour, and every hour of every day is literally a gift from God. Unfortunately, in all of the hustle and bustle of our lives, we forget this. Instead, we are more often stressed out by this gift than thankful for it. Think about this: God gives to every one of us all the same amount of time in a day.

Sometimes it's just our perspective. What if we were to get up every morning and thank God and remember that "This is the day the Lord has made, let us rejoice and be glad in it." It wouldn't give us any more time, but maybe our perspective each day would change and we'd appreciate the gift of time a little more.
