MISSION OF THE MONTH

Wisconsin Annual Conference 2023 In-Gathering

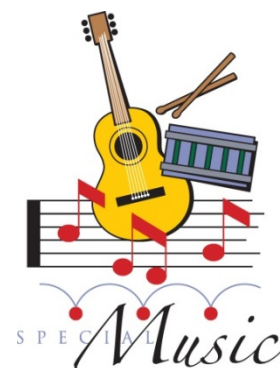
It has been my observation that home based hospice care services are on the increase as opposed to being confined to their hospital-like setting. They work hard to find ways to serve each person's unique needs.

UNITED METHODIST COMMITTEE ON RELIEF

Started in 2002, the UMCOR Coffee Project is a collaboration between Equal Exchange and the United Methodist Committee on Relief to involve more Methodist communities and individuals in supporting small farmers around the world.

For each pound of fairly traded coffee, chocolate, tea, and foods Methodists purchase through the UMCOR Coffee Project, 15 cents per pound goes to UMCOR's Small Farmer Fund, helping to increase the capacity of two coffee co-ops, Sopacdi and Muungano in the Democratic Republic of Congo. The projects improve quality management processes and strengthen their commercial relationships in the international market. That Fund amounted to \$19,604.17 in 2012 alone!

The United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) is the relief and development agency of the United Methodist Church. It is dedicated to alleviating human suffering around the globe, and reaches people in more than 80 countries, providing humanitarian relief in the face of conflict or natural disaster.

UMCOR's goal is to assist the most vulnerable persons affected by crisis or chronic need without regard to their race, religion, gender, or sexual orientation. They believe all people have God-given worth and dignity.

While UMCOR cooperates with other aid organizations to extend their reach, they consider their most important partners to be the people they serve. They find that that successful solutions to emergency or chronic conditions begin with the affected population. UMCOR provides these survivors not only temporary relief but long-term education, training, and support.

Equal Exchange is a Fair Trade organization that buys directly from small-scale farmer cooperatives, owned and run by the farmers themselves. Because our farmer partners are paid above market prices for their crops, they are able to make investments in community projects, educational programs, and technical trainings. These cooperative organizations also help keep rural communities healthy and strong, and keep local cultures vibrant. Equal Exchange is also committed to supporting sustainable farming methods that help green the earth through reforestation, natural resource conservation and organic practices.

PROGRAM AT THE HILLTOPPERS MEETING ON APRIL 10

Madison Gas & Electric has been in business for about 150 years.

MG & E has 157,000 customers using electricity. They have 166,000 customers using natural gas.

Their goal is to be net-zero by the year 2050. The definition of net-zero is a target of completely negating the amount of greenhouse gases produced by human activity, to be achieved by reducing emissions and implementing methods of absorbing carbon dioxide from the atmosphere.

Present plans are to shut down the coal fired plant near Portage sometime in the next 2 years.

The costs of installing solar farms and wind turbines are shared with other utility companies because of the high cost of installation.

Solar farms that have the capability to move the panels so that they are always in direct light from the sun are able to produce 25% more electricity than those panels located in a permanent position. Solar panels are capable of producing some electricity even if it is a cloudy day.

MG & E has a goal of having 100% of their company-owned fleet of vehicles all electric by 2030,

Madison Metro has recently added 3 all electric buses.

STEWARDSHIP - A CHICKEN OR AN EAGLE?

“Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God — what is good and acceptable and perfect.” (Romans 12:2)

Once upon a time, a man found the egg of an eagle. It had been abandoned for some reason by its mother, but as it was still warm, the man took it and put it in the nest of one of his backyard chickens along with the other eggs that were there being brooded upon.

After a period of time, the eaglet was hatched, and along with the other chicks from his nest began to go about the backyard doing what the other chicks did. He scratched the earth for worms and insects. He looked for the corn that the man would throw into the yard. 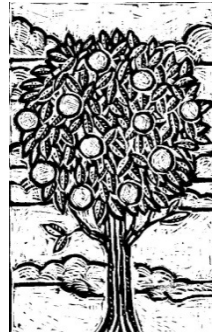
