PRODECOOP is an umbrella cooperative organization that brings together 38 village-level cooperatives from Esteli, Madriz and Nueva Segovia in northern Nicaragua. It is made up of about 1,000 small farmers—30% of whom are women. The cooperative provides services such as agricultural extension services, training, marketing, credit, capacity building of cooperatives, coffee quality programs, and social development projects. PRODECOOP provides continuous education of its members to expand each member's ability to be a strong farmer and a leader in her or his co-op and community. Since 1992, PRODECOOP has exported directly to international markets in Europe, the United States, and Japan.

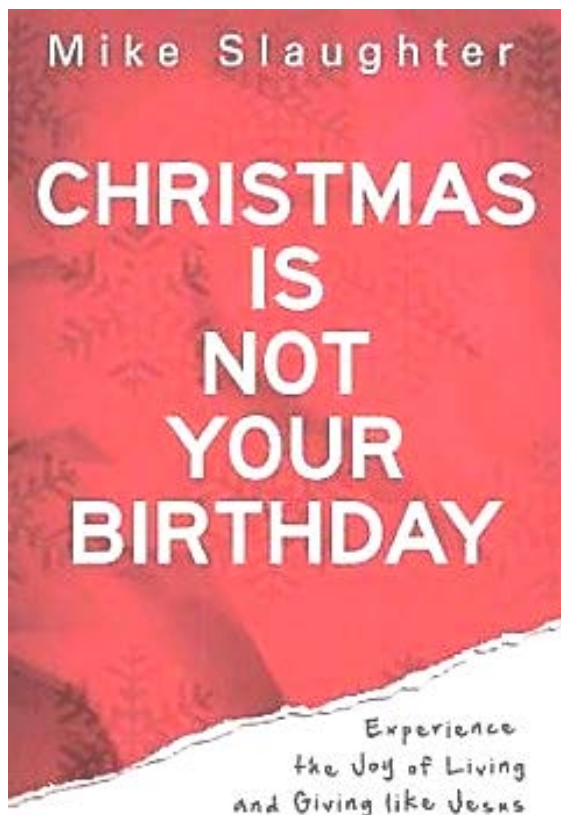

Overspending, overeating, materialism, and busyness rob us of our peace and joy and rob Jesus of his rightful role as the center of our celebration.

This Christmas, cut through the hype that leaves you exhausted and broke at the end of the year. Instead, experience the peace of knowing that God is truly with us, the joy of giving sacrificially, and the love of a Savior who gave everything he had for us. In five short, engaging chapters, Pastor Mike Slaughter inspires readers to approach Christmas differently, and be transformed in the process.

FOR THE LOVE OF GOD'S CREATION

...don't be fooled by our wonderful summer...

After our recent, decent summer, it might be hard for us who live in Wisconsin to actually buy into the phenomenon of global warming. Nature has seemed predictable. The weeds have grown as usual. The tomato crop has been fantastic. Neither the mosquitoes nor the Japanese beetles were bad and there were plenty of pollinators around.

Although we have not recently had any noteworthy reminders of climate change in Wisconsin, if you look at Patsy's CH&SOC bulletin board in fellowship hall, you will come to find out how climate change quietly is affecting a number of sectors in our state:

- **TOURISM AND OUTDOOR RECREATION.** Increased frequency and intensity of rain during the warm months will damage or reduce access to parks, beaches, lakes, and rivers. Warmer winters and precipitation shifting from snow to rain or freezing rain is limiting ice fishing, skiing and other winter activities. All depriving us from refreshing adventures in nature and negatively impacting the economy of local communities.
- **FOREST PRODUCT INDUSTRY.** Warmer winters means more frequent thawing of land, preventing machinery access to manage the forests and transport out the harvested wood. Drier conditions and warmer temperatures are increasing risk of wildfires and reducing suitable habitats for many northern and boreal tree species.
- **PUBLIC HEALTH AND SAFETY.** Climate change's impact on public health and safety is of primary concern to all inhabitants. More intense and frequent rains can result in flooding, eroding soil and coast lines, washing out of roads and bridges, breaking dams, overwhelming sewer and wastewater treatment plants all great human health stressors. Increased frequencies of extreme heat can cause heatstroke and exacerbate chronic illnesses such as asthma, cardiovascular disease and diabetes. Especially vulnerable are pregnant women, children of all ages, and the elderly.
- **WILD RICE PRODUCTION.** Spiritually, culturally, and nutritionally important to native Americans in the state, wild rice is vulnerable to a range of climate changes, from warmer winters, more humid days and nights, fluctuating lake levels and heavy rains. Climate change threatens to move the plant's habitat further north, putting this important resource out of reach to Wisconsin tribes.
- **ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE.** While most of us may not yet notice, communities of color, tribal nations, and low-income communities are often the first and worst hit by extreme weather, industry shifts and pollution. Environmental justice refers to efforts to address these injustices.

While we wait for the leaders of our world, legislators and corporations, to put a stop to green-house gas emissions everywhere, we could help, by signing up for renewable energy with our electric company. The extra monthly charge will be minimal. **Do it for the love of God's Creation.**
